Latitude and Longitude

Latitude and longitude are two coordinates that are used to describe the location of a place on the Earth's surface. Latitude is a measure of how far north or south a place is, while longitude is a measure of how far east or west it is.

Latitude is measured in degrees, with the equator being at 0 degrees. Places to the north of the equator are given a positive latitude, while places to the south are given a negative latitude.
