3.1 – Responses to the Environment

Explain how the behavioural and/or physiological response of an organism is related to changes in internal or external environments.

Organisms respond to changes in their environment through behavioural and physiological mechanisms.

- **Photoperiodism and phototropism in plants**
 - o **photoperiodism** – response to amount of darkness and daylight
 - o **phototropism** – response to light (bending/growing towards sunlight)
 - o **gravitropism** – response to gravity (growing down into Earth)
 - o **thigmotropism** – respond to touch (ivy grows around a post)
- **Taxis and kinesis in animals**
 - o **taxis** – movement towards or away stimulus
 - **phototaxis**(sunlight)
 - **chemotaxis**(downfood)
 - **geotaxis**(gravity)
 - o **kinesis** – undirected movement in response to stimulus
 - **orthokinesis**(speed)
 - **taxis**(turning)
- **Nocturnal and diurnal activity** – awake at day or night

Organisms exchange information with one another in response to internal changes and external cues, which can change behaviour.

- **Stimulus** – internal/external signals that involve a response
- Response to stimuli affects fitness
- Flight or fight response
- Predator warnings
- Insect responses to herbivory
